

In memory of Professor Denys Brunsden

With great sadness we inform that Professor Denys Brunsden, one of the founders of the International Association of Geomorphologists and the first IAG President (1989–1993), passed away on 25 January 2024. Denys was Professor at King's College in London, UK, from which he then retired to his cottage in Dorset, close to large complex landslides which were central to his pro-

fessional career. He will be remembered as a brilliant visionary scientist, author of a range of highly influential publications, but also as a great promotor of international collaboration in geomorphology and supporter of early career scientists. He was Honorary Fellow of the IAG and one of the IAG prizes was named after him (Brunsden Medal). An obituary written by P. Migoń will soon be published on the IAG website.

International Geomorphology Week 2024

From 1st to 7th March the International Geomorphology Week took place for the fourth time in a row. The aim of the International Geomorphology Week is to promote geomorphology in all its forms and to mobilise the geomorphological community. In cooperation with our National Scientific Members 10 regional webinars were organized by the IAG. In total, 77 speakers from 55 different countries were invited to give a scientific presentation with the aim to highlight new talents and emerging themes across the geomorphological community. As in the previous years, a number of great supplementary events took place during and around the International Geomorphology Week. We greatly acknowledge the enthusiasm and the high level of activity throughout the entire week.

The chairs of the GSA Quaternary Geology & Geomorphology Division organised this year's North America Webinar during the International Geomorphology Week. IAG is now co-organising two topical sessions at the annual GSA Connects meeting from 22 to 25 September in Anaheim, USA. One session focusses on "Earth Surface Processes in Tectonically Active and Unstable Regions (T51) whereas the second session is about the "Impact of Contemporary Climate Change and Human Activities on Geomorphological Hazards" (T52). IAG co-organised session at ICG 2024, Busan, Republic of Korea




